The proceedings of the G.B. are duly recorded and are saved in the computer for future references including keeping hardcopy of the same. Democratic norms are maintained in the decision making in every level of administration. Suggestions from ex-students are also welcome.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

As per the statute, the college has to follow and implement curricula as formed by the University of Calcutta, but academic calendar has been maintained by the college be to followed meticulously. However, this college has made a curriculum of its own in M.Sc. Course in Mathematics to prepare the students to be truly worthy of this degree.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

1. By conducting class, annual tests on regular basis, the college makes the students better equipped for examination.
2. By holding seminars, quiz contests, academic workshops students are kept abreast of new developments and current trends in education.
3. Students are imparted practical based knowledge through field study, project work etc.
4. Audio-visual medium viz. OHP, Computers etc. are wide used in teaching.
5. Students are encouraged to question the teachers, also to discuss among themselves to have a thorough understanding of the subject.
6. Internet facility has been extended to all the students apart from teaching and non-teaching staff.
7. Since a bulk portion of the students are either First generation or second generation learners, teachers make the students to have self belief.



6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- 1.The college conducts University Examinations every year.
- 2.The college holds class tests, mid-term tests and annual tests to evaluate the progress of the students.
- 3.The answer-scripts are shown to the students and discussed in detail for rectification.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- In spite of space constraints, this college encourages the teachers, most particularly, the young teachers to take research projects and for this to achieve necessary space and equipments are provided as far possible.
- The result of the encouragement has already been showing its' fruits. As many as eight to ten teachers are presenting Minor research Projects in various fields of their interests.
- In order to update the current trend in research, teachers are provided with various journals, magazines etc. They are also released from their duties of the college to attend seminars. paper

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- To have automation of the library service has been started at war footing basis and considerable progress has been already achieved in this direction.
- Up-to-date books, journals, employment news, magazines etc. are purchased on regular basis and keen eyes are given so that library users get maximum benefits.
- Wi-Fi facility has already been extended.
- Laboratories and other allied streams are upgraded by purchasing equipments, instruments etc.
- Some departments have their own departmental libraries.
- ICT Rooms are there.
- Internet Service has been provided to all library users.



6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- College has attempted all avenues to get maximum use of available human resources.
- College has limited scope in recruiting teachers or teaching staff as these are governed by Govt. Nevertheless, the college also appoints some guest lecturers casual non-teaching staff to compensate the dearth of permanent teachers and non-teaching and special quality staff.
- For managing the affairs of the students the college has constituted Students' Union following C.U.'s Guidelines, so that grievances of students get proper voice and redressal.
- Similarly, a duly elected Teachers' Council is there to discuss the ways and means for smooth running of academic matters. There is also a Non-Teaching Association for taking up the matters of non-Teaching staff.
- Above all, there is a Governing Body which looks after the entire affairs of the college for smooth running. G.B. has representatives from teaching and non-teaching staff and from students. Outside members are present to take up a neutral but academy-friendly decision on every matter.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Recruitment of faculties is governed by state Government through its agency namely College Service Commission. For recruitment of Non-Teaching Staff this college follows strict guidelines of the state government. For recruitment of Guest Lecturers and casual non-teaching staff the college maintains transparency in the form of advertisement in News daily, website by forming a selection committee, which in turn being formed by the apex body of administration-namely the Governing Body.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

Some agencies viz. VAP technology conducts campus Interview to recruit students from the college. College is always to collaborate with industries or employment agencies for the benefit of students.

- Students are admitted partially on on- line basis following the guideline of the University of Calcutta and state Government regarding minimum qualification for admission in various courses and also regarding seat reservation for SC, ST, OBC, Minority, PH students.

- Admission Committee members along with teachers help the students seeking admission in all respects viz. counseling, filling up of forms in online method.

- The college has so far not been able to ensure cent percent attendance due to their economic stringency and their effort to supplement their family income.
- **Opportunity-** To introduce P.G. Courses in some subjects.

8. Plans of institution for next year

- i) Digitalisation of rare books
- ii). To introduce rigorous self-appraisal for teachers
- iii) To establish a strong and meaningful placement centre to help students to get employment.
- iv) To introduce spiritual education by inviting specialists in this field as this is of utmost importance in curbing violence in young minds and also to promote universal brotherhood.
